



### Alaska’s Economy Depends on Worldwide American Companies

Alaska's 201 worldwide American companies and their employees need a level international playing field to prosper and grow. These companies support substantial employment and economic output in Alaska, directly through their production of goods and services, through their suppliers, and through spending by the people they employ.

If the Congress raises international taxes on worldwide American companies – while other nations are adopting more competitive tax structures – it will put Alaska companies and their employees at a competitive disadvantage with their foreign competitors and jeopardize the substantial contributions they make to Alaska’s economy.

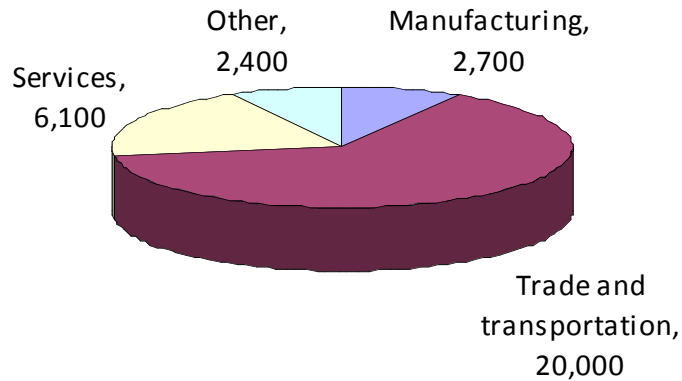
\*The direct contribution consists of employment in and the payroll and production of worldwide American companies in the state.

\*\*The indirect contribution consists of employment, payroll, and production supported by worldwide American companies through their supply chains and the consumption spending of the people they employ directly or indirectly.

- In 2007, worldwide American companies in Alaska employed **31,200** people and supported an additional **78,300 jobs** through their supply chains and spending by the people they employed directly or indirectly.
- These jobs accounted for **32.8 percent** of all private-sector employment in Alaska and **34.2 percent** of the total private-sector payroll in the state.
- Worldwide American companies in Alaska create high quality jobs, paying on average **\$52,519 per worker** in wages and salaries and fringe benefits in 2007.
- Worldwide American companies in Alaska accounted for **52.0 percent** of Alaska’s GDP (\$13.5 billion) in 2007.
- Worldwide American companies also paid approximately **\$293 million** in dividends to Alaska residents in 2007.

## Direct Employment by Worldwide American Companies in Alaska by Industry

Worldwide American companies employed **31,200** Alaska workers in 2007 in a wide range of industries, including the following:



**Trade and transportation: 94 companies, 20,000 jobs**

**Services: 87 companies, 6,100 jobs**

- Administrative and support services: 13 companies, 1,500 jobs
- Food services: 8 companies, 800 jobs
- Health care and social assistance: 6 companies, 500 jobs
- Other services: 68 companies, 3,400 jobs

**Manufacturing: 35 companies, 2,700 jobs**

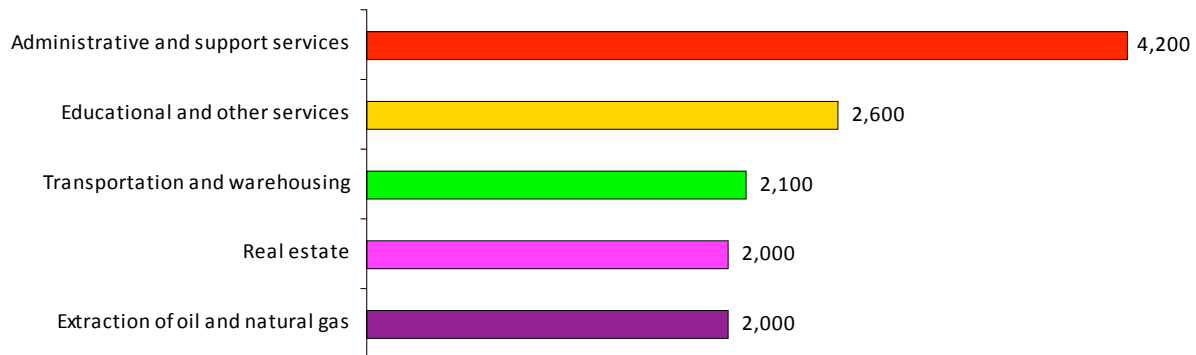
- Transport equipment except motor vehicles: 3 companies, 900 jobs
- Food: 2 companies, 400 jobs
- Primary metals: 1 company, 400 jobs
- Other manufacturing: 30 companies, 1,000 jobs

**All other industries: 20 companies, 2,400 jobs**

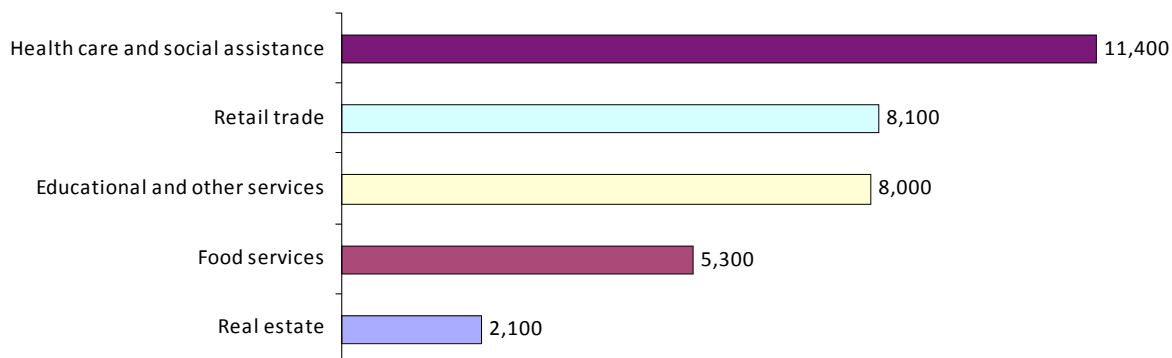
## Indirect Employment through Purchases of Goods and Services from Suppliers
