



**Kansas’s Economy Depends on Worldwide American Companies**

*Kansas's 571 worldwide American companies and their employees need a level international playing field to prosper and grow. These companies support substantial employment and economic output in Kansas, directly through their production of goods and services, through their suppliers, and through spending by the people they employ.*

*If the Congress raises international taxes on worldwide American companies – while other nations are adopting more competitive tax structures – it will put Kansas companies and their employees at a competitive disadvantage with their foreign competitors and jeopardize the substantial contributions they make to Kansas’s economy.*

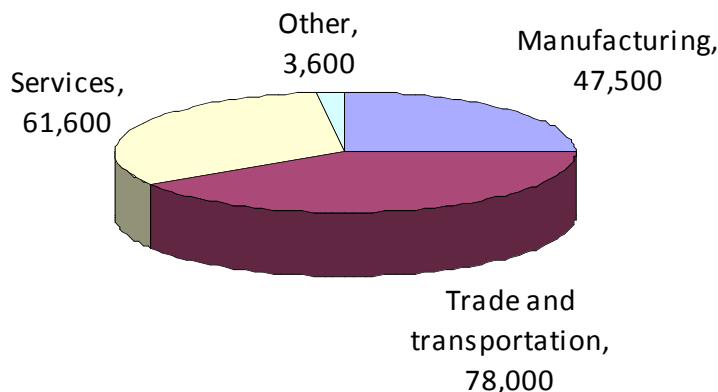
*\*The direct contribution consists of employment in and the payroll and production of worldwide American companies in the state.*

*\*\*The indirect contribution consists of employment, payroll, and production supported by worldwide American companies through their supply chains and the consumption spending of the people they employ directly or indirectly.*

- In 2007, worldwide American companies in Kansas employed **190,600** people and supported an additional **415,400 jobs** through their supply chains and spending by the people they employed directly or indirectly.
- These jobs accounted for **39.3 percent** of all private-sector employment in Kansas and **42.3 percent** of the total private-sector payroll in the state.
- Worldwide American companies in Kansas create high quality jobs, paying on average **\$49,551 per worker** in wages and salaries and fringe benefits in 2007.
- Worldwide American companies in Kansas accounted for **47.5 percent** of Kansas’s GDP (\$48.9 billion) in 2007.
- Worldwide American companies also paid approximately **\$1.7 billion** in dividends to Kansas residents in 2007.

## Direct Employment by Worldwide American Companies in Kansas by Industry

Worldwide American companies employed **190,600** Kansas workers in 2007 in a wide range of industries, including the following:



### **Services: 270 companies, 61,600 jobs**

- Food services: 16 companies, 9,300 jobs
- Administrative and support services: 60 companies, 8,700 jobs
- Telecommunications: 15 companies, 7,800 jobs
- Other services: 214 companies, 35,800 jobs

### **Trade and transportation: 253 companies, 78,000 jobs**

### **Manufacturing: 193 companies, 47,500 jobs**

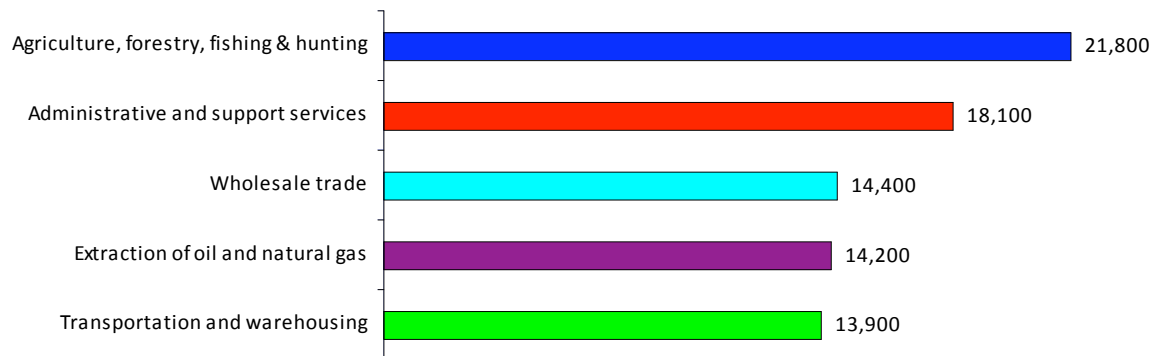
- Food: 19 companies, 8,900 jobs
- Transport equipment except motor vehicles: 14 companies, 6,100 jobs
- Chemical products: 30 companies, 5,800 jobs
- Other manufacturing: 148 companies, 26,700 jobs

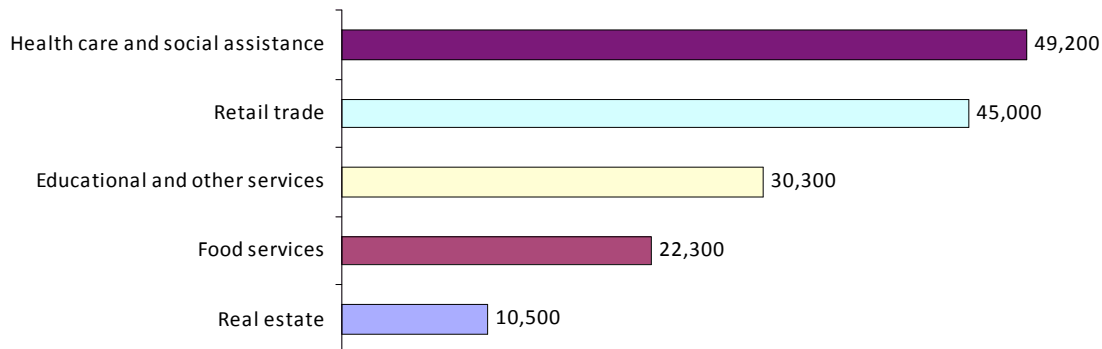
## Indirect Employment through Purchases of Goods and Services from Suppliers
